On behalf of the ACLA Board and the Local Organizing Committee, it is my distinct pleasure to welcome you to the 2020 conference in Chicago. This year's conference takes place in the heart of the Windy City, a short distance from many of its world-class cultural, culinary, and leisure attractions.

With its unique seminar format, distinguished keynote and plenary speakers, and workshops geared toward graduate students, the ACLA annual conference offers an unparalleled intellectual feast. Part of the same initiative, the Brazilian and the Korean associations have also organized sessions on Friday and Saturday. On Friday afternoon, join us for a screening of a documentary on Chicago's Black Arts Movement, and then a Board-sponsored session on "Ethics in the Academy," chaired by Vice-President Sangeeta Ray, followed by a social hour for graduate students. All participants are cordially invited to the opening reception on Thursday evening and the Presidential reception Saturday night, following the Awards Ceremony.

PARKING

The Sheraton Grand and Gleacher Center are located in downtown Chicago and parking may be difficult and costly. Fortunately, the conference site is readily accessible via public transit (trains and buses). See Public Transportation below for further information. TAXIS AND RIDESHARING

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

The Chicago Transit Authority (CTA) website provides schedules and route maps of elevated trains and buses serving the downtown area (referred to by locals and in transit materials as "the Loop"). Note that the Sheraton and Gleacher are slightly to the northeast of the downtown area, toward Navy Pier:

Please note that CTA trains and buses both accept the Ventra Card pass. Ventra cards and singleride passes can be purchased at most train stations and a variety of retail locations (including Walgreens and CVS stores).

Transportation to/from the Sheraton Grand and O'Hare International Airport (ORD): There is a Blue Line train station inside of O'Hare airport. Pass cards (called a Ventra pass) can be purchased inside the train station. Take the train from the O'Hare blue line station to the Grand blue line. Transfer to the 65 Bus from there heading in the direction of Navy Pier and exit at Illinois & St. Clair. The Sheraton is a two minute walk from that location.

Transportation to/from the Sheraton Grand and Chicago Midway International Airport (MID) There is an Orange Line train station inside of Midway airport. Pass cards (called a Ventra pass) can be purchased inside the train station. Take the train from the Midway station to the orange line State/Lake station. Transfer to the 124 bus heading in the direction of Navy Pier an exit at Columbus & North Water.

The conference site is within walking distance from several train stations and buses.

This roundtable focuses on publishing a scholarly monograph for the first or the second time. Topics include the difference between a dissertation and a book, transitioning to the second book after tenure, preparing for a meeting with an editor, imagining appropriate audiences, writing a book proposal, publishing in a book series, and the specific challenges and possibilities for publishing research that is multilingual and comparative. Following brief presentations from the panelists, the workshop will devote the remaining time to addressing questions from the audience. The issue of canonicity has been broadly discussed at least since the spread of cultural influence from the European great powers to the peripheral areas. In the past, the classical literary canon had suppressed the diverse differences in locality, gender, and generation. Here, the question of literary democracy arises. What matters now is to recognize the changeability, rather than originality, of canonicity. In this panel, we pay special attention to how canonicity was maintained or how it evolved in (pre)modern Korea in order to understand how we can define canonicity in different contexts of society and history. We are looking for those minute cracks inside the configuration of canons and we aim to scrutinize the examples of re-canonization in peripheral literatures.

"Present Tense: The Iconology of Time" by W.J.T. Mitchell (University of Chicago)
Our plenary speaker, W. J. T. Mitchell, known universally as Tom, is the Gaylord Donnelley
Distinguished Service Professor of English and Art History at the University of Chicago, where
he has taught since 1977. A peripatetic scholar with curiosities unlimited by period, discipline, or
area, Mitchell has ventured into the realm of the dinosaurs (*The Last Dinosaur Book: The Life and Times of a Cultural Icon*, 1998), into the world of images, galleries, museums, and movie theaters
(*Blake's Composite Art*, 1977; *Iconology*, 1986; *Picture Theory*, 1994; *What Do Pictures Want?*,
2005; *Image Science: Iconology, Media Aesthetics, and Art History*, 2015), and into the zone known
quaintly as the American public square (*Cloning Terror: The War of Images*, 9-11 to the Present,
2011; *Seeing Through Race*, 2012; and the co-authored *Occupy: Three Essays in Disobedience*,

2013). He has explored the radically private spaces of the uneasy mind in the forthcoming *Mental Traveler: A Father, A Son, and a Journey Through Schizophrenia*, 2020.

Readers everywhere know him as the long-time editor of the Chicago journal *Critical Inquiry*, which under his editorship has published special issues on canon-formation, gender, race and writing, public art, politics and poetic value, metaphor, psychoanalysis, identity politics, pluralism, new directions in art history, questions of evidence, intimacy, comics and media, and many other special topics. His co-edited collection *Critical Terms for Media Studies* (2010) offers a common vocabulary for an expanding field.

Professor Mitchell is a member of the American Philosophical Society, the British Academy, and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. His writing has been supported by the Guggenheim Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the American Philosophical Society, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Exxon Educational Foundation, the Clark Institute for Art History, and the Getty Research Institute, among other institutions. The University of Chicago has recognized him with its Award for Distinguished Graduate Teaching, and (twice) with the Laing Prize for the year's most distinguished faculty publication; in a vindication of his lifelong interdisciplinary interests, he also received the College Art Association's Lifetime Achievement Award for the Teaching of Art History.

"Present Tense: The Iconology of Time," his plenary address to the American Comparative Literature Association's 2020 annual meeting, asks which pictures and metaphors capture our sense of the mood of the times in which we live, and what these indicate about our larger pictures of time as such. Though human beings have traditionally operated on question-specific time-scales, from the split second of police decision-making to the "deep time" of climate change and species extinction, the "affective temporality" of our moment appears to cause the collapse of such scales, leaving us to characterize our times in the language of insanity. Images drawn from our current visual references testify to the iconology of a tense moment in human history.

Presidential Address and Awards Ceremony | Chicago Ballroom VII - Sheraton Grand "Geopolitics of Comparison: World Literature *avant la lettre*", an address by Waïl S. Hassan (University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign), ACLA President

According to a well-known genesis story, the concept of world literature and its academic correlative, the discipline of Comparative Literature, began in the early nineteenth century with Goethe's use of the term Weltliteratur, the rise of Germanic and Romance philology in German universities, and the creation of a chair in "Littérature étrangère" at the Sorbonne. The migration of European Romance philologists to the US in the middle of the twentieth century gave the American "school" of comparison its shaping influence, but American Comparative Literature would be radically transformed a few decades later, opening its gates to Asian, African, and Latin American literatures. But what if the story began earlier, before nationalism and national literature became the horizon against which Goethe and other cosmopolites formulated their ideas; and further south, in Spain and Italy, countries whose histories are entangled with the Arab presence in Europe during the medieval period? The picture would look different, and one of its consequences would be that the trajectory of American Comparative Literature becomes less of a linear, progressive march toward greater openness and inclusivity than a circling back to a pre-Romantic understanding that, notwithstanding its Eurocentric universalism and belief in progress, stressed the fruitful interaction of world cultures and what we might call, in today's critical parlance, their irreducible hybridity.

ACLA meetings and events are convened for the purposes of professional development and scholarly and educational interchange in the spirit of free inquiry and free expression. Professional academic ethics and norms shall apply as standards of behavior and interaction at these meetings and events.

ACLA seeks to provide an environment in which diverse participants may learn from each other, interact in scholarly exchange, and enjoy the company of colleagues in an environment of mutual human respect. Some behaviors are, therefore, specifically prohibited as they may contaminate this environment.

Harassment of colleagues, students, or other Participants in ACLA meetings and events undermines the principle of equity at the heart of our meetings and events and is inconsistent with the principles of free inquiry and free expression. Consequently, the ACLA considers all forms of harassment to be a serious form of professional misconduct. This Code of Conduct outlines expectations for all those who attend or participate in ACLA meetings and events.

1. Purpose

ACLA is committed to providing a safe and welcoming conference environment for all Participants, regardless of actual or perceived gender, gender identity, race, ethnicity, national origin, sexual orientation, ability, socioeconomic status, age, or religion. "Participant" in this policy refers to anyone present at ACLA meetings and events, including ACLA staff, contractors, vendors, exhibitors, venue staff, ACLA members, volunteers and all other attendees.

2. Expected Behavior

All Participants at ACLA meetings and events are expected to abide by this Anti-Harassment Policy in all meeting and event venues including ancillary events and official and unofficial social gatherings. These are our basic guidelines:

- Abide by the norms of professional respect that are necessary to promote the conditions for free academic interchange.

4. Reporting and Investigation

ACLA will use reasonable efforts to investigate complaints in accordance with reasonable standards of due process and fairness and will maintain confidentiality to the extent reasonably possible. If deemed necessary, the Executive Committee may consult outside counsel to assist in the investigation. No individual will be retaliated against for making a complaint or assisting with the investigation of a complaint.

5. Penalties for Unacceptable behavior

Anyone who is found to have engaged in harassment will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action. ACLA reserves the right to expel, censure, and/or bar from future ACLA meetings and events any Participant who violates this Anti-Harassment Policy.
