Letter from the President

Dear ACLA members,

Last month we gathered in Montréal/Tiohtià:ke, on the unceded and traditional territories of the Kanien'kehá:ka Nation, to share ideas and be in conversation about the intellectual, cultural, and political commitments that shape our work, about the disciplinary and institutional formations that both support and constrain it, and about ways of moving forward individually and collectively in our discipline and in our organization. For many of us, coming together in person after the years of the pandemic still feels like a particular pleasure, still not to be taken for granted. Indeed, at a moment when the ongoing military assault on Gaza by the state of Israel has brought about a devastating loss of life and the destruction of countless cultural and educational sites—including all 12 institutions of higher education in Gaza—our pleasure in gathering and learning from one another is also colored with grief and dismay that so many others are being denied this same experience. Our work and our community, and how we conceive of our work and community, take on heightened significance in such times.

In that light, I want to thank ACLA's Chief Administrative Officer Danielle Fanucci, our Communications & Development Officer Brigid Kennedy, and our Secretary-Treasurer Dina Al- Kassim for their tireless work throughout the year to keep the organization running, and particularly for their work in making our annual conference the success it was this year. Committee, headed by E.K. Tan. Last but not least, many thanks are due to Ranjanna Khanna, our outgoing president, for her years of service to the organization on the presidential ladder, for her thoughtful and elegant leadership, and for her moving and timely presidential address, "On Sex and Death, *or* the Problem of Thinking Comparatively."

I also want to make special note of ACLA past president Waïl Hassan's efforts in bringing together the States of Comparison Seminar, which highlighted some of the work that has gone into the State of the Discipline Report, for which Waïl and his fellow past president Shu-mei Shih are serving as co-chairs of the editorial committee. The State of the Discipline Report is compiled once every decade; past reports have become important historical records tracing the development of the field both intellectually and institutionally. The current report, which will be released in fall 2024, is still accepting submissions of 1,000-5,000 words, aimed at addressing a series of topics: "Languages, grounds, translation," "Theories, paradigms, methods, keywords," "Worlds, regions, minorities, geopolitics," "Histories, temporalities, periodization," "Power, justice, ethics," and "Institutions, pedagogy, employment." Submissions will be accepted until May 1, 2024, and scholars of all ranks are encouraged to submit through the link provided on the report's website, stateofthediscipline.acla.org.

During my year as president, I will be focused largely on continuing the ACLA's recent efforts at internationalization by increasing the profile of translation, and particularly the translation of critical and theoretical works from the Global South, in our organization and discipline. These efforts will be in keeping with the Vice Presidential Seminar I organized for the conference in Montréal, "Translation and Epistemic Justice in a Comparative Literature Context." They will also continue Ranji Khanna's work in organizing online events outside the space of the annual conference, as I plan to host a handful of translation-focused discussions and workshops over the course of this coming year.

One last reminder: our 2025 conference will be held virtually. The Executive

In 2005, Palestinian civil society issued a call for boycott, divestment, and sanctions (BDS) against Israel. ACLA joins other academic organizations in endorsing this call from our Palestinian colleagues. We note identity is not complicity and that the Palestinian-led BDS campaign against Israel is one that targets institutions and not individuals, and we recognize the right of all scholars to academic freedom as well as the right of all scholars to choose whether or not to participate in an academic boycott. Since the ACLA engages in socially responsible investment practices, it is our best understanding that the organization is already divested from corporations that benefit from Israeli apartheid and occupation, and we call upon other academic

boycott, and will give effect to this commitment in a manner consistent with ACLA's bylaws as well as relevant US federal, state, and local laws. We urge other scholarly organizations to do the same.

Remembering Monica Popescu



Monica Popescu and Sheila Giffen, Research Trip, 2011

Monica Popescu, Professor and William Dawson Scholar of African Literatures in the Department of English at McGill University, began a different journey on February 24, 2024. A leading voice in African and Cold War literary studies, her most recent monograph, *At Penpoint* (2020), won numerous prestigious awards, including an honorable mention for the MLA's Aldo and Jeanne Scaglione Prize for Comparative Literary Studies. Her ongoing projects at the time of her death reflected her continued commitment to comparative literature and the comparative method. She was working on at least three books, including a monograph on the rise of the world literature paradigm, a scholarly biography of Ngũgĩ wa Thiong'o, and an edited collection on the Global South. Monica was also a dedicated member of the ACLA, serving on its board as chair of the Publications Committee. Under her leadership, the committee adjudicated the Helen Tartar First Book Subvention Award and held workshops on publishing first (and then second) books. Monica demonstrated her dedication to the success of junior faculty working on comparative literature through her work with the ACLA.




Fiction: Silences that Speak," edited by M. Teresa Caneda-Cabrera & José Carregal-Romero

"Narratives of the Unspoken" is an open access collection of essays. This volume offers an in-depth analysis of silence as an aesthetic practice and a textual strategy which paradoxically speaks of the unspoken nature of many inconvenient hidden truths of Irish society in the work of contemporary fiction writers. The book 's attention to silence provides a rich vocabulary for understanding what unfolds in the quiet interstices of Irish writing from recent decades. This study also invokes the past to understand the present and, thus, demonstrates the continuities and discontinuities that define how silence operates in Irish culture.

"Abiayalan Pluriverses: Bridging Indigenous Studies and Hispanic Studies," edited by Gloria E. Chacón, Juan G. Sánchez Martínez, & Lauren Beck

"Abiayalan Pluriverses" looks for pathways that better connect two often siloed disciplines. This edited collection brings together different disciplinary experiences and perspectives to this objective, weaving together researchers, artists, instructors, and authors who have found ways of bridging Indigenous and Hispanic studies through trans-Indigenous reading methods, intercultural dialogues, and reflections on translation and epistemology.
