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Last spring, I nau the opportunity to present my menon mays ondergraduate

Fellowship research project entitled "The New Negro, Negrismo, and Négritude: Examining Articulations of Black Womanhood in Twentieth-Century Afro-Diasporic Literary Movements" at the ACLA's annual meeting. My presentation explored literary representations of Black womanhood within canonical texts of the New Negro, Negrismo, and Négritude movements, and it subsequently compared these works to 1970s Black feminist and womanist articulations and reclamations of Black womanhood situated in the same Anglophone, Hispanophone, and Francophone regions. As a part of the undergraduate seminar, I presented alongside other young scholars, and collectively we engaged in fruitful and lively discussion. Though the conference was entirely virtual due to COVID-19 restrictions, I was still able to connect with some of the other undergraduates afterwards and even share bibliographies.

As a young, Black woman scholar, I am committed to including and promoting Black thought within the field of comparative literature. The importance of Afrodiasporic engagement in the comparative literary field cannot be understated. Comparative literature is such a wonderful discipline because it allows scholars to think expansively, transnationally, and multi-linguistically. When the globality of Blackness is not included within this transnational field, myriad opportunities for exciting and important scholarship are lost. I am proud to study the literatures of the Black diaspora in French, English, Spanish, and Portuguese, and I look forward to continuing to research, write, and present on the power and vastness of the Black literary world in my future. (I am currently applying to PhD programs, so wish me luck!) I am so grateful that I was able to present my work at last spring's annual conference, and I hope that in the future more undergraduate comparative literary scholars who research the Black diaspora are able to do the same.
